About the project We'll be exploring how nurses see the challenging topic of 'being dangerous, violent or aggressive'.

The project is being co-produced by a team of consumers, nurses and others working together. Reimbursements are available.

About photo-voice We'll ask you to take photos about your perceptions, write captions for the photos, then talk about these in two workshops with other nurses.

Time commitment Total of 6-8 hours, including:

- 1 hour: Optional information session
- 2-3 hours: Take photos & write captions
- 4 hours: 2 x 2-hour workshops

Eligibility There are eligibility criteria to take part in this project, explained on the expression of interest webpage.

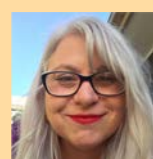
We hope to find new ways for the mental health system to think about violence, aggression and danger which promote fairness (equity) and safety for everyone.
